Richmond Hill Group Celebrates 50 Years in York Region

The Richmond Hill Group is living proof of the importance of archives and of keeping accurate records for those of us who value history. Recently, an interview with someone who was at the first meeting stated our inception was January 18, 1959. The records of a 1980 business meeting state January 17 as a possible birth date. To avoid confusion, the group has decided to celebrate future group birthdays on the fourth Friday of January.

The Group's Co-Founders were Norm L. and Fred D. They were advised to contact Pastor Jim O'Neill at St. Mary's Anglican Church in Richmond Hill for a room to hold AA Meetings. Fred and Norm approached Pastor Jim, and here we are, 50 years later. We owe a great debt to our landlord, who has been generous in providing us with a space for almost 50 years at reasonable cost.

Originally, the meetings were held on Wednesdays at 8:30 p.m. Often, in the early days, only a half dozen were in attendance, including wives. The meetings started in the small room and, as the group matured, a closed discussion meeting was held on Wednesdays and an open speaker meeting was held on Fridays in Wrixon Hall. The rent was free until the group began to pay \$5 a month; since 1969 the group has been able to increase its monthly donation to the church. The

chairperson brought lunch, which was usually sandwiches.

We, the members of the Richmond Hill Group, feel privileged to be one of the oldest groups in York Region, which has blossomed to about a million residents. A debt of gratitude is owed to our Higher Power, for the blessings of longevity and the opportunity to pass on the AA message. Some of the fruits of passing it on came when Marlene and John M. found a location for a Sunday morning breakfast meeting. Even though it has been a meeting of the Richmond Hill Group since May 1977, its biggest strength is that many groups all over York Region contribute to its success. Although it is called the Skylight meeting, it has been referred to as the Sunday morning beacon of AA in York Region.

Members of the Richmond Hill Group have been instrumental in passing the message on and starting additional groups over the years. Groups such as the King City Slippers (March 1971), and Back to Basics (1992) were started by former members of the Richmond Hill Group. Come help us celebrate sobriety at St. Mary's Anglican Church in Richmond Hill on Friday January 23, 2008 at 8:00 p.m.

Principles before Personalities

Charles M. was my sponsor from shortly after he received his 25 year medallion in the year 2000, until he passed into the Spirit World on September 18, 2008. I asked him to be my sponsor because I knew that he had been a lawyer as well as having earned a Master's of Divinity degree. As an alcoholic, I was always interested in the underlying angles of how things operated.

Even though I had eight years of sobriety, Charles had me go through the Big Book and do the Steps, keeping his keen legal mind and eye focused on what the words said and not what one thought they said. That was helpful as I was able to focus on the exact nature of my wrongs. My searching and fearless moral inventory had shown me that my score card read zero. When drinking, I had not cared about anybody else except myself. Together, and with God's care, the layers of justification were dismantled and fear was removed. After that, we still continued to remain in daily contact by phone and enjoyed weekly face-to-face sit-downs.

Charles said that the only thing that a person could do on his own was drink. For everything else, you needed to be involved with others in recovery. He summed up the essence of the program with the first two words of Step One: "We admitted..." He said that it was a "we" program and that "admitting" meant to be honest.

With such clarity of perspective, Charles spoke of practising rigorous honesty. He believed that we could apply principle to the ideal, that we may not have an absolute monopoly on the "Truth", but by willing to keep an open mind as we learned more, we could be continually transformed and grow.

Though in his senior year his youthful bounce was somewhat modified, Charles still determinedly made his way to newcomers to offer his encouragement and phone number. He said that the only thing longer than a grave was a rut.

Charles was a power of example in the letting go of the concerns of this world. He had accepted their limitations fully and has moved into completeness and fulfillment in the embrace of The One who originally said that "you are needed, wanted and loved."

The Twelve Traditions

In the pamphlet, "A.A. Tradition," published in 1947, Bill W. writes: "Nobody invented A.A. It grew. Trial and error has produced a rich experience. Little by little we have been adopting the lessons of that experience, first as policy and then as tradition.

"That process still goes on and we hope it never stops. Should we ever harden too much, the letter might crush the spirit. We could victimize ourselves by petty rules and prohibitions; we could imagine that we had said the last word.

We might even be asking alcoholics to accept our rigid ideas or stay away. May we never stifle progress like that!" In a letter to an A.A. member named Dewey, dated April 14, 1958, Bill explained the process: "Like Topsy, the tradition idea sort of grew. In the early days, the office was beset by group problems, jillions of them. So many letters had to be answered by a limited staff that we were forced to codify the answers. A form letter, to be accompanied by a note, was the original idea. So in 1945, I drew the draft which boiled down into the old 'long form' Twelve Traditions. As I worked at these, I could see that they might have implications, great implications in effect, for the whole of our society. So, on the spot, I named them traditions to accelerate this effect.

"At first, practically nobody approved the Traditions. As time went on, they became valuable in solving group problems. By the time of the Cleveland International Convention in 1950, the common consent was so large that we asked the Convention — a good cross-section of A.A. — to approve them, which it did."

Diversions from Our Primary Purpose

I received an email recently regarding cell phones at meetings. A great eye opener, especially when related to our traditions regarding “primary purpose” (Trad 5) and “money, property and prestige” (Trad 6). It was pointed out too, that not only is it a major distraction if it goes off, but it also brings “dishonour” to AA — a place that is helping us to live a better life.

Equally distracting and disruptive are dogs at meetings. It is clearly an attention seeking and ego inflation behaviour that takes no account or consideration for others in the same room. Some folks love dogs, others hate them, some are allergic to them and others fear dogs. Whatever our individual feelings are, each of us has the right to choose our level of contact with dogs and not have them thrust upon us at AA meetings.

As we mature in AA, our ability to laugh at ourselves and humorous situations becomes progressively more acute. Oftentimes, a well-delivered message includes funny anecdotes and incidents “appropriate” to and “related” to the speaker’s experience, strength and hope. Some folks seem compelled to start their talk with a joke or one is delivered from the floor during announcements. A lot of these jokes are off-colour, sexist, put-downs or sarcastic. I suppose they might be alright at a Toastmasters meeting or in a bar, but in AA where we deal with serious life or death issues, I suggest, they are misplaced.

I am not immune to the trappings of “money, property and prestige” but through the teachings of AA they are taking on a less prominent

role in my life. As a steward of the AA program, these issues (cell phones, dogs and jokes) jeopardize and put at risk the message being delivered to the newcomer — “our primary purpose” and dilute “the joy of good living” to which we all aspire.
