General Service Conference From Josh Eggleston, A.A. Grapevine Board Chair Re: Preamble Revision Date May 28, 2021

Dear Conference Members:

Several people have asked when the revised Preamble will be seen in print. In keeping with the final advisory action of the 71st General Service Conference, the A.A. Preamble revision replacing the words "men and women" with "people" will appear in the July issue of Grapevine, and its translation will be in the July/August issue of La Viña. Both of these issues will be mailed, and posted online, on June 15, 2021. After June 15, as new Grapevine, La Viña and A.A.W.S. literature or reprints go to press, and as web pages are updated, the language will change wherever the A.A. Preamble appears.

The June issue of Grapevine was on press when the Conference requested the change, so this is the first opportunity to make the adjustment in the magazines.

We've also received a number of inquiries about whether this negatively impacts the editorial independence of Grapevine. Please remember that the Grapevine Board, Publisher and Editors discussed this topic for an entire year over a series of board meetings. Ultimately it was agreed that Grapevine has the right of decision and foundational editorial independence. We felt that such a change would affect the groups as a whole and in keeping with Tradition 4, we sought the input from those it might affect by sending the discussion to the General Service Conference.

The topic was actively discussed in groups across the United States and Canada for two years over both the 70th and 71st General Service conference panels. As a result of those conversations the Delegates of the General Service Conference passed a series of votes, in a sequence of events that culminated with the final advisory action requesting:

"The Preamble revision replacing the words 'men and women' with the word 'people' be presented to the General Service Board for approval as the new revised A.A. Preamble."

Having been accepted by the General Service Board and forwarded to Grapevine for fulfillment, the Publisher and editorial staff at A.A. Grapevine went to work to carry out the will of the Conference with love and service.

I hope you are all having a wonderful experience reporting out the results of the 71st General Service Conference and thank each of you so very much for your dedicated service.

fellowship of people who share their experience, strength and hope with each other that they may solve their common problem and help others to recover from alcoholism.



A.A. is not allied with any sect, denomination, politics, organization or institution; does not wish to engage in any controversy, neither endorses nor opposes any causes. Our primary purpose is to stay sober and help other alcoholics to achieve sobriety.

Embracing the SEVENTH TRADITION

Every A.A. group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.

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- 1. In July 1934 Ebby T. was approached by his friends Cebra G. and Shep C. in Manchester, VT. They had done considerable drinking with Ebby but were now abstaining from drinking. They informed Ebby of the Oxford Group in VT but Ebby was not quite ready yet to stop drinking.
- **2.** In July 1934, Bill W. met Dr. Silkworth when admitted for the 2nd time to Towns Hospital (again paid by Lois's brother-in -law Dr. Leonard Strong). Dr. Silkworth explained the obsession and the allergy of alcoholism to Bill. Bill started drinking again almost immediately upon discharge. He was unemployable, \$50,000.00 in debt, suicidal and drinking around the clock.
- **3.** On July 4, 1935 attorney Bill D. (man on the bed) leaves St. Thomas Hospital in Akron, Ohio sober and becomes AA No. 3 (Big Book story Alcoholics Anonymous Number Three). Sister Ignatia and Dr. Scuden secretly treat Bill D. prior to his meeting Dr. Bob and Bill W. Bill D. was hospitalized 8 times in 1935 for his drinking. It took 5 days before he would say that he could not control his drinking. Bill D. was Ohio's Panel 1 Delegate to the 1st General Service Conference in 1951 and he spoke at the ORC in Toronto in 1953. Bill D. died September 17, 1954 with 19 years of sobriety.
- **4.** Bill W. invited Messrs. Richardson, Chipman and Scott, of the Rockefeller Foundation to his home on 182 Clinton St. New York on July 15, 1938 for meetings of Alcoholics Anonymous. This was the first documented use of the name of the Fellowship.
- **5.** On July 27, 1938 Dr. Silkworth wrote a letter of support for use in fundraising for the book. It was later incorporated into the First Edition Big Book April 1939 into the chapter "The Doctor's Opinion" together with extracts from a paper later published in the Lancet medical journal in July 1939. The Doctor's Opinion started on page 1 and the basic text ended at page 174. Dr. Silkworth's name was not added to the "The Doctor's Opinion" until publication of the second edition in 1955.
- **6.** In the July 1962 Grapevine, Editor Jack M. creates the cartoon strip Victor E. and it appears for the first time in the Grapevine. Today, Victor E. is an A.A. icon.
- **7.** In July 1982 non-alcoholic Milton Maxwell becomes trustee emeritus on account of illness. Non alcoholic Gordon Patrick from Toronto becomes the 1st Canadian Chairman of the Board at GSO.
- **8.** July 5th to 7th 1985 the 50th Anniversary and 8th International Convention was held in Montreal with about 44,000 in attendance. The theme was "50 Years With Gratitude". Ruth Hock Crecelius was given the 5 millionth copy of the Big Book. Ruth was Bill W.'s 1st Secretary and typed the manuscript of the Big Book as Bill dictated.
- As part of the festivities surrounding A.A.'s 50th Anniversary, Stepping Stones, Bill and Lois's home since 1941, was declared a New York State Historic site. In Montreal's Olympic Park Stadium, the flags of 53 nations represented at the Convention were paraded as a band played their national tunes. They represented nearly half the 114 countries where A.A. was to be found. The House of Seagram, the largest distiller of alcohol beverages, paid an unusual but good-natured tribute to A.A. For the duration of the International Convention, the three flags at their Montreal head-quarters were lowered to half-staff.
- **9.** July 2nd to 4th 1993 the celebration of the 50th commencement of A.A. in Canada was held at the Metropolitan Toronto Convention Centre with about 6,000 in attendance. On Wednesday, January 13, 1943 at 6:00 pm the first meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous in Canada took place at the Little Denmark Restaurant on 720 Bay Street (on the west side) between Gerrard and College Streets in Toronto. Present at the meeting were two non-alcoholics, Reverends George Little and Percy Price and six alcoholics; Tom E., Bruce M., Sam McC., Bus McT., Dorothy C. and Weems C.
- **10.** June 30th to July 3rd, 2005, the 70th Anniversary and 12th International Convention was held in Toronto with over 44,000 in attendance, the first city to host the International Convention twice. The theme was "I Am Responsible" repeating the theme of the 1965 Convention held in Toronto. The Convention commemorated the 50th anniversary of Bill W. turning over the operation of the Fellowship to the Conference in 1955 in St. Louis.

STEP SEVEN IS A CONCLUSION

Step Seven Prayer: "My Creator, I am now willing that you should have all of me, good and bad. I pray that you now remove from me every single defect of character which stands in the way of my usefulness to you and my fellows. Grant me strength, as I go out from here, to do your bidding." Amen.

There was true humility and deep surrender by asking God to "take all of me," both the "good" and the "bad." This was an admission that I could not trust myself to differentiate between the two. I almost drank after five months sobriety before going into the 12-step process with my sponsor. He wisely pointed out the obvious fact that my mind lied to me - It was not to be trusted! I needed a higher power (God) to see the truth about myself. What an egoshattering revelation! Yet, it was necessary to give up on myself and trust God to take over my recovery. Someone said: "Self cannot rid self of self with self."

I had asked God to remove the "bondage of self" in Step Three with only a scant idea of what that was, but Steps Four and Five provided a better view of my defects of character and shortcomings. (By the bye, Bill W. stated that these words were to be used simultaneously or in the same context - please note that Step Seven on page 58 uses the word "shortcomings" rather than "defects of character" as in the prayer above).

It is important to notice that the Seventh Step prayer concludes with the word "Amen" meaning "So be it" or indicating a conclusion. However, there is no "Amen" following the Third Step Prayer, or following Steps Four, Five and Six! Why?

I think because Step Seven finally concludes the process, e.g.: In Step Three we asked to be relieved of the bondage of self, but we did not know what that was till we did Steps Four and Five. But now in Step Seven we know more precisely what we are asking God to remove from us as we go out to do his bidding. The process has been concluded, however, more will be revealed.

Is it a reward for a new leaf turned and from a degree of struggle? Or perhaps a gift from somewhere or some unseen benefactor, someone or thing looking out for and guiding me on this new path. At this point I no longer care to ask, I simply accept that the fact that I am still here, still breathing, finding focus and balance is enough for me to accept, if not surrender with grace and gratitude these truths as I understand them to be.

It is exactly this appearance of some understanding and calm that brings me to an epiphany or revelation. This being that my apparent success in such a short time has led others whom I care deeply for to seek me out and ask that I diagnose and prescribe a cure, antidote or vaccine for that same sickness that infects them as it does me. But the problem you see is that I am neither a physician or sponsor nor councillor and I do not possess the knowledge or skill required for such a feat.

As I told you in the beginning I am an alcoholic, my name is David and the best and right thing I can do to help those who seek guidance is to give them a number to call, get them a cab, or perhaps call their dad to come help, and while waiting I can hold their hand. You see if I don't enforce my boundaries and dive right in we will both surely drown then neither one of us wins. So all that ask if you're going to call please do it early and not after last call.

It seems sobriety while a gift that comes from hard work and the ability to hear and digest not just listen also comes with some strings attached: things like honesty, accountability, the courage of your convictions, identifying and removing defects of character and yes even faith. Ego, for me, is still a defect requiring attention while not attention-seeking. GROUP SPOTLIGHT: North Toronto

The North Toronto Group started in 1946. After meeting in private homes throughout the Toronto area, the North Toronto Group first opened their doors to members of A.A. at St. George's United Church on Duplex Avenue. A decision was made that a larger venue was necessary to support the growing fellowship. Since these early times and partly due to renovations of the original venue, the group moved to Glenview Presbyterian Church at 1 Glenview Avenue in 2019.

Like many groups, the transition continues today online. The North Toronto Group meets Tuesdays for a speaker and open discussion meeting. On Fridays we meet for A.A. step meetings and Sundays for a closed meeting and afternoon of general A.A. recovery discussion.

I know from first-hand experience that the North Toronto Group is very welcoming to the newcomer and offers a great meeting option for all, regardless of sobriety dates. I attended the online meetings 3 times over the past month or so. They offer the recovering alcoholic a safe place of fellowship and sharing of collective experiences of strength and hope, as they have for decades.

Always lively with many long-time members sharing their stories of hope and recovery while encouraging all to share their thoughts and feelings on recovery and how A.A. has helped them along the way.

Some of the meeting topics recently discussed are the importance of meetings, freedom through sobriety and the well known slogan, "First things first."
