

Concept Eleven

While the trustees hold final responsibility for AA's world service administration, they should always have the assistance of the best possible standing committees, corporate service directors, executives, staffs and consultants. Therefore, the composition of these underlying committees and service boards, the personal qualifications of their members, the manner of their induction into service, the systems of their rotation, the way in which they are related to each other, the special rights and duties of our executives, staffs and consultants, together with a proper basis for the financial compensation of these special workers, will always be matters for serious care and concern.

In this, the second longest of the Concepts, Bill explains in great detail the composition, functions and relationships

of the standing committees of the General Service Board, its subsidiary operating boards, the General Service Office and the AA Grapevine — as they existed in 1962. As AA has grown and changed, many of the descriptions would be different today, and some of the issues that are addressed are no longer relevant. Nevertheless, the full text is valuable as an historical document, and many of the principles still apply, as summarized below.

Underlying the service structure we have been discussing, there is another, internal structure of service consisting of the nontrustee members of the trustees' committees; the non-trustee directors of the two operating boards, and the executives and staff members. "Members of this group," declares Bill, "not only support the leadership of the trustees: they share leadership with them." The following are "several principles . . . which" apply to AA

World Services, Inc. and the AA Grapevine, Inc.:

- 1. The status of executives: No active service can function well unless it has sustained and competent executive direction. This must always head up in one person, supported by such assistants as he needs. That person has to have ample freedom and authority to do his job, and he should not be interfered with so long as his work is done well.
- 2. Paid workers, how compensated: Each paid executive, staff member or consultant should be recompensed in reasonable relation to the value of his or her similar services or abilities in the commercial world Cheap help is apt to feel insecure and inefficient. it is very costly in the long run. This is neither good spirituality nor good business. Assuming service money is available, we should therefore compensate our workers well.
- 3. Rotation among paid staff workers: At AA's General Service Office, most staff members' assignments are changed every two years. When engaged, each staff member is expected to possess the general ability to do, or to learn how to do, any job in the place excepting for office management.
- 4. Full "Participation" of paid workers is highly important: We have already discussed the necessity of giving key paid personnel a voting representation on our committees and corporate boards. They should enjoy a status suitable to their sponsibility, just as our volunteers do.

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DID YOU KNOW... that on May 3, 1980, the first Information AA Day was held in Toronto? It was a combined effort of Toronto Intergroup & the six districts in and around the city.

Interview: 12 Step Committee member Simon W.

I'm a member of the Intergroup Executive Committee and a liaison to the 12 Step Committee. I also serve on the overnight phones on rotating basis, and have served on the phones during regular hours as well.

1. What is the purpose of the 12th Step Committee and what is its role in helping the still suffering alcoholic?

The purpose of the Committee is the same as the primary purpose of AA: to help other alcoholics to achieve sobriety. Using the steps and traditions as guidance, we staff the main phone line at Intergroup to provide information to those who are attracted to us. We advise them of how the program works, where and when meetings are located, and on more nuanced questions.

2. What is a "12 Step Call"?

One could interpret every phone call we take as a "12-Step call", but in practice it is an in-person visit from 2 or more recovering alcoholics to carry our message to a suffering one. It's usually requested of a group member by a loved one or acquaintance of the subject, but the phone greeters sometimes field requests and refer to our massive lists of 12-Steppers to find someone located close by and ideally with some similarity (age, gender, language, etc.).

3. Why do you need to have training to "work the phones"? What is involved?

Training is a misnomer – it's really orientation to the vast array of information we have available. We have lists of 12-Step call volunteers by geographical area, languages spoken, gender, age, availability to travel, and so on. We also have lists of detoxes, nearby Inter-

groups, meetings, and service meetings. Training typically takes a couple of hours on the first Sunday of the month (sometimes the third as well).

4. What kind of commitment is expected in volunteering on the phones once training has been completed? Is there a sobriety requirement?

The Committee looks for regular and permanent commitments: it's better that one commits to a short shift once every four weeks and always shows up, than committing to Saturday evenings every week and cancelling half of their shifts. We can accommodate all sorts of schedules and there are shifts in 2, 2.5, 4, and 5 hour blocks, arranged in four week schedules. The sobriety requirement is one year of continuous sobriety.

5. What do you like personally about this particular service role?

I really like being able to pass on our program's complex and intimidating principles in digestible and simple ways to people who are just "dipping their toes in". Often you can actually hear their relief over the phone when they realize AA is probably a good idea and they aren't alone, and that what we're offering isn't scary at all.

6. With technology changing so quickly into a less-talk-more-text role in society, are 12 Step calls still as frequent as they once were?

I've only been doing this for a yearand- a-half, but from what I've heard, they have dropped off dramatically. A lot of our meeting information and our program's material is available for free online. We tend to get calls from people who are looking for meetings, have specific questions, or are what we call "serial callers" – people who perhaps mistake our service for a crisis line, which it is not. The Committee is starting to look at other ways to engage alcoholics, like having a chat window on the website, similar to what some companies do for customer service, but we remember there are lots of people without computers and think it's very important that we have focused, attentive phone greeters in the office waiting to ansvacalls for any alcoholic.

7. How does one get involved?

Call Intergroup between 9 a.m. and 9:30 p.m. and express your interest. Ask for the next training date and show up, and you'll be in the trenches in no time.

History of Information AA Day:

Six Districts and Toronto Intergroup - 1995 (Seven Districts)

The following Information AA Day history was obtained from Tommy Hills Fonds (records) from cooperative meetings: General Service and Toronto Intergroup, Information AA Day, Feb. 20, 1996. All text is original except 2005 to 2015.

1979 preliminary discussions:

- The three people primarily responsible for this day were Tom Hills, Sandi Taggart & Murray Dorey.
- Initially the tickets of admission were \$1. It was held in a high school because there were many rooms where various committees could have meetings. The panel participants were split evenly between Intergroup and the service Districts.
- The name Information AA was chosen to share information available in Toronto from all sources with all members in Toronto. The day was also for the Delegates to give their report from the General Service Conference in New York to all members of AA in Toronto as soon after the Conference as possible. It was also used to introduce one member of the staff from New York.
- Re-districting had just occurred. Districts had increased from four to six as of Jan. 1, 1980. It was felt it would save money by having the Delegate come once for all six districts.
- It was emphasized that members participating were to be chosen evenly from Intergroup and the General Service Districts.
- Information AA Day committee was to consist of the DCMs and the Operating Committee members of Toronto Intergroup.
- The chairperson of the first Information AA Day on May 3, 1980, was Tom Hills, DCM Toronto City East.

* The move to Lansing United Church was made because the high schools were raising their prices and it was becoming difficult to meet the costs of the location, the Delegate and the person from New York. It also meant the format of Information AA Day had to change since there was no longer the number of rooms available to permit meetings of all the service committees

The following excerpt is taken from a May 11, 1980, letter from Tommy Hills to Bob Dobson:

"I wish to Thank You on behalf of the committee & myself for your participation in our Information AA Day. It was the first time that the six General Service Districts in and around Metropolitan Toronto and Toronto Intergroup have combined to inform the membership about the services being performed.

There has always been confusion and to some people a mystery about what is being done and by whom. I suspect there is still a great deal to be explained and only the tip of the iceberg has been revealed, but the initial attempt has now been made to have everyone involved. Hopefully this first approach will be expanded and become at least an annual gathering in Toronto."
