# Searching for the flag of the City of Akron

My name is Lee and I'm an alcoholic. I had the privilege of serving Alcoholics Anonymous as the Panel 58 Delegate from Area 07 - California **Northern Interior.** 

Not too long after I first came into contact with A.A. in 1983 in Southern California, I began to travel back to Brazil, where I grew up, and attend meetings there.

In the early 2000s, having survived going back to drinking for a couple of years, I became very interested in general service and was shortly thereafter elected as GSR of my home group. As I continued on that path, I found myself traveling to Brazil a few times each year, often participating in general service events there. Over time, I have become an unofficial liaison between their general service structure and ours.

In the fall of 2010, I was attending an event there and I was asked if I might be able to obtain a flag of the City of Akron. At their various events, they have a custom of parading the flags of states and counties, along with the national flag and flags of A.A. and Al-Anon at the beginning and closing events. They told me in 2011, they would be celebrating 50 years since the arrival of A.A. in the state of Minas Gerais, in the city of Juiz de Fora, 200km north of Rio.

Upon my return to the U.S., I started off by searching the internet but fairly quickly realized that although such a flag existed, it was not available for purchase anywhere. My next thought was to call the central office in Akron and they suggested that I contact the City of Akron business office.

Following a number of phone calls to various city departments, I finally ended

up talking to the mayor's secretary. She asked that I send her an email describing why I was wanting the flag. This was turning into a public information effort. Although the mayor's office was aware of the meaning of Akron to A.A., they were not aware of the worldwide reach of A.A. today.

After a few more days, I heard back from the secretary, letting me know that the mayor was interested in helping us out. Not only did he send us a full-size flag, but he also included an official proclamation of June 10-12, 2011, as the days of the 50th anniversary of A.A. in Minas Gerais, Brazil.

In June 2011, when I travelled to Juiz de For afor the anniversary celebration, I brought those items and presented them to the A.A. members there. I was given the privilege of carrying the flag of the city of Akron in the flag ceremony held during the event. Since then, the flag has been displayed at a number of other A.A. events in the state of Minas Gerais.

On June 9-11, 2017, I was invited to participate in a gathering of Area 33 in the city of São João del Rei in Minas Gerais. Towards the end of the event, I was approached and asked to share the story of how I obtained the flag of the

city of Akron, as the area had now decided to pass it along to the national archives of A.A. in Brazil. The presentation was made to Dr. Jaira Freixiela Adamczyk, class A trustee (non-alcoholic) and currently chairperson of the general service board of Alcoholics Anonymous in Brazil. There were about 250 A.A. members present, including the very first chair of the general service board in Brazil from 1983, Dr. José Nicoliello Viotti, now trustee Emeritus, Dr. Oscar Cox, another trustee Emeritus and many other past and current trustees, members of the general service board, GSRs, DCMs, area officers, delegates and Al-Anon participants. There was loud cheering from the members, knowing that now the flag would become part of the history of A.A. in Brazil.\*

Once again, I was reminded that no matter in what culture or language, the manifestations of alcoholism are the same and that is good news because it means that if we translate our literature into other languages, alcoholics anywhere can find a solution to their problem through the program of Alcoholics Anonymous.

### "I am Responsible ..."

Each group has but one primary purpose – to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

I've been attending A.A. meetings for about 40 years. The first couple of years, I had little success. I was 12-stepped by various people and would not have kept coming if it weren't for them. They reached out to me when all hope was gone. They came to me in a men-tal hospital, psychiatric wards, on the streets and took me out of bootleggers. Eventually, I got sober and stayed sober for 10 years. Then, I went back out and when I came

back in, I noticed there was very little, if any, 12-stepping. I haven't heard it discussed at meetings or mentioned by speakers.

I've been back 15 years now and I do 12step calls. My first sponsor told me to pay it forward and the Responsibility Pledge is my guide.

Seven years ago, I had a call from a drug dealer who had a customer with a drug and alcohol problem. No one would come to this woman, so I went. She called me many times over the next few

years. She got a year clean and sober and went back out. At one point, she tried to kill me. She is now coming up to five years sober in September and still calls me every day. I have discovered that it doesn't matter if the person I try to help doesn't succeed in staying sober. As long as I am still sober, it was a good call.

I had my 15-year medallion a couple months ago and my speaker was the same woman who calls me every day.







"We develop discipline in order to serve the group conscience by obeying it as a trusted servant. We do what god delegates to us through the group."

This concept is all about discipline, delegation and focus in our own program in the rooms, serving with authority in our groups as per the group conscience (GC) regarding any decisions that lie therein when given a position. It means following the GC to the best of my ability and asking if I am not sure, attending business meetings and participating in them, not only with issues but with solutions, and continuously being of service in some capacity as long as I continue to stay sober.

While this sounds like a tall order, it service? My service sponsor explained really is not difficult. When we first get sober, we are encouraged to take on a service commitment, usually setting up chairs, making coffee or greeting at the door. This concept speaks to doing those 2, I look at the discipline I take in my things as the position is laid out in the GC and showing up every time (if I can't, I send someone in my place). As we gain some time in program, other positions become available outside the group level in the form of the GSR. That position, should I be honoured to take it, requires more time and attendance at district and area meetings. I must also show up to those and should any conference or meeting I attend require my own. I had to let the legacies me to speak on behalf of the group, I am able to do so with authority as a trusted servant. Bill and Bob could not do everything when they got the ball rolling with our program so a structure was laid out as A.A. grew around the world to entrust delegates to assist in carrying the ultimate authority.

When I first be-came involved in general service some 20 years ago, I had




little understanding of how the traditions or concepts could stretch into "all my affairs." After all, were they not guidelines for the groups and world to me that the three legacies of recovery, unity and service (steps, tra-ditions and concepts) must all be consid-ered in a well-rounded program. So, for concept personal life so that I can serve the group as well. As an active drunk, I could not be relied upon for much of anything, except for being at the bar at 5:30 p.m. every night after work! I had to become a regular attendee at my home group, do what I said I was going to do, be willing to hand over the reigns to my Higher Power, sponsor and GC because I was truly unmanageable on discipline my behaviour and say yes to any request A.A. asked of me.


