### The Importance of Service work in a Treatment Facility - Walter Y.

I feel a little strange saying it, but I have, thanks to my HP and this Fellowship , been around for a lot of single days at a time. The most important and fulfilling work for me has been the outreach or as we call it, the 12th step work in which I have been privileged to take part.

Often, it felt right for me to be more passive, to rely on the requests for sponsorship, on friends who knew I was sober and needed what AA has to offer. Now I have to ask myself what opportunities I might have missed, to help another suffering alcoholic and to grow spiritually.

By the time the newcomer has walked through the door, some level of Step One acceptance or desperation has shown up. And for whatever reason, AA was the choice made.

This isn't the case in the treatment centre. We can't assume that all their work is 12 Step oriented. Nor is it always a choice to be in treatment at all. Many of us end up there because of family, company insurance plans or judicial order.

Offering meetings within the centre may be the only contact with AA.

How many times has someone shared in a meeting that they had finished

treatment and, having no contacts, no phone numbers, or fellowship safety net, went back out and spent years before getting into the rooms? How many do we know of who have died because of it?

One of the miracles of my sobriety has been the opportunities I have had to take a meeting into treatment centres on a regular basis. To be honest, I was dragged by a sponsor at the time. It was uncomfortable to find myself back in the kind of place my alcoholism had sent me to. I didn't enjoy it at all, I went back though, and by the third time, I was hooked. I could go into the nitty gritty of it, I could be more honest (I don't know why, but it was my truth). I was able to relate to these guys and some became sponsees, some ended up greeting me at other meetings and the sense of camaraderie Was palpable.

The post Covid landscape has changed, new relationships with the centres need to be forged. That's true. However the need out there for the Message of Hope that we can bring has not changed. It is essential, the amazing need for reciprocal energy offered by AA.This is how we grow in service.

# Vision of Hope Turns 30

The Vision of Hope Group is celebrating 30 years! The group was formally established on August 5, 1993, when it was registered with GSO in New York.

The names of the people who started this group are a bit vague, but it was likely Francis because he was instrumental in starting this group at its original home at Square One (SQ1).

At that time SQ1 had, besides an LCBO store, a multi-denominational chapel, where a meeting was held every Saturday at 1:30. The group flourished and started a Service meeting at the Westminster United Church located at the corner of Rathburn and Tomken. But things at SQ1 changed, and the group had to move around 1999 or 2000.

St. Mary's Catholic Ukrainian Church on Cawthra Road became the next home, and the meeting was moved to Thursdays at 1:30. The group did well, and even roundups were held at this location. People like Art, Jeff, and later Dan and Rod were instrumental. When the group had to move again around 2015, it was Jeff who found a spot at the Salvation Army – further south on Cawthra Road. The service meeting at the Westminster church also flourished and Dan ("Big Book Bandana Dan") became instrumental in setting it up.

When he passed away, Donna took over his role until Covid, shook things up. Donnie became instrumental in setting up a Tuesday service meeting at the same location. Rod became instrumental in running the Thursday Vision of Hope meeting by filling in for Jeff when he went on vacation for the summer of 2018. When Jeff never returned, Rod and a few others kept the Thursday meeting going.

In 2020, Covid shut down a lot of meetings including Vision of Hope and the Westminster service meeting. It was not until November 2022 that attempts to revive the Vision of Hope were

After 30 years the Vision of Hope is flourishing again at the location of its old service meeting!

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# **ARCHIVES** CORNER

## Mother of AA

Anne S. was called the 'mother of AA' with good reason. She was not only loved by recovered alcoholics but by the wives and family members who suffered silently in the background.

One wife wrote movingly of Anne after their meeting.

"When I first heard of the wives meeting together, I thought, I'll be damned if I want to hang around with a bunch of drunks with their broken-down haggard wives. I felt so bitter and resentful inside. I felt like it was his problem and I didn't want to be going to someone else's home. I was hesitant, fearful but then again, if it would stop the drinking, I would do it for that. I certainly didn't need anyone's help! Strangely enough, when Anne extended her hand at the door and said "Come in, dear", my heart nearly melted. She was as gracious, as friendly, as charming as any woman I had ever met or known."

That love of Anne's changed things. She knew how to handle the wife of an alcoholic. She knew the days and nights full of despair, the poverty-stricken effort to keep up appearances, the unsatisfactory blending of shabbiness and pride. Every meeting with a newcomer was a fresh experience. She greeted strangers and listened for their names. Next time she'd be able to call them by name.

In those early days most people didn't have telephones. Anne handed out a little address book and told us "All our homes are open to you. Drop in any time." And they did.

Anne Smith hated to wear a new dress. She would say, "I hate to wear a new dress. So many people will be there who can't afford a new one. I hate to embarrass them." It was that bigness of heart, this continual thinking of others that enabled Anne to shape a formless group into what was eventually to become the foundation for A.A. in Akron.

# DID YOU KNOW?

- 1.On Sept. 13, 1937 Florence R. (story in 1st edition Big Book "A Feminine Victory") is the first female AA in New York. She helped Fitz M. start Washington Group. She returned to drinking in 1949. One night Fitz was called to identify her body at the Washington Morgue. She committed suicide.
- 2.In the Sept. 1948 issue of the Grapevine, the Serenity Prayer was first printed & became a vital part of AA.
- 3. In Sept. 1973 Archives was established at General Service Office (GSO) in New York & Nell Wing, one of Bill's earliest secretaries became the first archivist.
- 4.On Sept. 1938 Fitz M. (AA No. 8 & story in Big Book "Our Southern Friend") sister Agnes lent Bill W. & Hank P. \$1,000.00 to help get them through the Big Book project.
- 5. From Sept. 1956 to Dec. 1956 & Feb. 1957 AA's popular slogan plaques were published in five Grapevine issues. Four slogans are from the Big Book: "But for the Grace of God" is from the chapter "There is a Solution" (pg 25). "Easy Does It", "First Things First" & "Live and Let Live" are from the chapter "The Family Afterward" (pg 135). "Live and Let Live" is also found in the chapter "To Wives" (pg 118). The slogan "Think, Think, Think" is a bit of a mystery. Some say it originated in Cleveland in the mid-1940's; however, its actual source is unknown.
